The protagonist of the second series, Claire Teynier, is an archivist and librarian at UNM. Books in both series have been regional and IMBA (Independent Mystery Booksellers Association) bestsellers. The Shadow of Venus, the fifth book in the Reynier series, was given the Zia Award from New Mexico Press Women for the best work of fiction by a New Mexico woman and was nominated for the Barry Award for the best paperback original of 2004. Van Gieson was awarded the Spirit of Magnifico Literary Award in 1996 and the Bravos Excellence in Literary Arts Award in 2002. After graduation from Northwestern University, Judith worked in publishing in NY then lived in Vermont before deciding to devote herself full time to writing. She first came to NM in 1981 and now lives in Albuquerque's North Valley. She has taught creative writing at UNM and at the Taos Summer Writers Conference. In 2007 she will teach a master class in the crime novel at the Taos Conference.

Convention Notebook by Helena Whyte:

It was difficult for me to choose only one session that resonated with me during my attendance at my first AAUW Association Convention. The plenary presenters and the Taste of Success posters were outstanding and inspirational.

Sherry Schiller challenged AAUW members, "No more business as usual." She said a focused vision, positive thinking, and action are the means to accomplish AAUW's goals. "Commit to mission based programming; do not confuse members about AAUW's mission and goals."

Greg Mortenson, AAUW member and author of *Three Cups of Tea*, told how he lives the African Proverb, "If you educate a boy, you educate an individual. If you educate a girl, you educate a community." He promotes peace through education. "When mothers are educated, they prevent their children from adopting extremist ideologies." Greg has facilitated the construction of more than 62 schools in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Branches are growing members through Student Advisory Councils and providing leadership skill building requested by the student leaders. I was especially intrigued by the California Online Branch. All programs, board meetings, and interest groups are attended online at members' convenience.

AAUW National Girls Collaborative Project advancing the agenda in gender equity launched a new project, *Let's Read Math* targeting positive attitudes about math in grades 1-4 through math activities in children's books such as A Quarter From the Tooth Fairy.

Since the AAUW membership will terminate at the end of 2007 this is a possibility for January 1, 2008 – January 1, 2009. The other suggestion that she made is to evaluate a partnership with some other national organization that would support IFUW. If you are interested in pursuing this, leadership is needed to step forward and craft a structure that would work. She suggested that you check the IFUW website. My interest in our ancestors' clothing began in college when I had to take a class in the History of Costume as part of my degree in Home Economics.
