Legislative Update: We need every member to contact her senator about the AAUW-NM pay equity bill, "Permitting Employees to Discuss Their Salary Without Retaliation". If employees are not allowed to discuss their pay, it is obviously very difficult to know if one's pay is equitable. It is common practice for employers to forbid pay discussions and to use such discussions as reasons for dismissal. Jeannette has assured the AAUW lobby corps verbally and in writing that she will support it, but the Senate is another matter. The Senate bill number is S305. If you don't remember which senator is yours, contact all three and say you are from Los Alamos. Just cut and paste this text: "I urge you to support senate bill S305 that permits employees to discuss salary without retaliation". Sign it with your name followed by Los Alamos. Legislative Day and Leadership Team Meeting:

Kristina Fisher from Think NM spoke at the winter LTM. This year, Think NM attacked the school dropout problem. Research has shown that large schools, large high schools being defined as over 1000 students, correlate with high dropout rates. This is true even when accounting for factors such as socio-economic status. Students who drop out report alienation and a sense of being lost in the crowd. Also economies of scale work only for numbers between 300 and 900 students, so large schools actually cost more. Learn more: http://www.thinknewmexico.org/policypubs.html

Martha Burk, money editor for Ms magazine and governor Richardson's advisor on women's issue, reviewed a study done of pay equity within several departments of state employees of New Mexico. Although there are some outliers, the state scores well. For businesses within the state, the statistics are not as encouraging for women.

Jeannette Wallace spoke about what information is important to give a legislator when lobbying for a bill. She finds it impossible to keep track of bill numbers and much more helpful if a constituent mentions a few words describing the bill and then the position they support. She emphasized the full time nature of her work and the many interim committees she attends when the legislature in not in session. She always keeps the best interests of her constituents in mind, most especially those living in the very small communities she represents in Sandoval (Jemez Mountains) and Santa Fe counties as well as Los Alamos.

Some of us learned that **Patsy Mink**, member of the U.S. House of representatives from Hawaii coauthored the Title IX amendment to the Higher Education Act of 1972. Mink had experienced discrimination in many forms. At the U. of Nebraska she was forced to live in a dormitory for 'students of color'. She organized a coalition and was successful in ending the university's segregation. She intended to go to medical school, but in 1948 none of the 20 medical to which she applied accepted women. She decided that the best way to cause change was to become lawyer and entered the University of Chicago law school. She returned to Hawaii, married, raised a daughter, practiced law, and became active in politics. In 1965, Mink became the first female minority in the U.S. Congress. She served six consecutive terms. During the 1972 Presidential race, Mink ran in the Oregon primary as an anti-Vietnam War candidate.

In Congress, Mink's most important coalition was one to support the Title IX Amendment of the Higher Education Act (renamed in 2002 the Patsy T. Mink Equal Opportunity in Education Act). It prohibits gender discrimination by federally funded institutions. Thank you Patsy.

At legislative day, the Los Alamos lobby corps contacted our representatives about AAUW issues such as education, pay equity and ethics reform. **Eric Vasquez** of Diane Denish's staff spoke to the state corps. Because of budget uncertainties, this is a very unusual session. Bills are moving extremely slowly as most bills have a financial component and cannot be considered until a budget estimate for next year is in place. However the administration is supporting reform in installment loan rates, mortgage originator regulation, loans on auto titles, improving the state contractor database, regional housing authority reform among others issues.
