Entries were identified only by their number and title (no participant names). Three class projects were given \$15 AAUW awards: How Far Can it Go (#270), Laser i3 Motion and Design: Proving Sir Isaac Newton's Second Law of Motion (#264), and Wood vs. Plastic (#267). Eleven projects received \$5

AAUW awards: Earthquake (131), Anatomy of an Eye, Cow vs. Sheep (163), Music Helps the Mind (160), Which Substance is Best for Cleaning Teeth (151), Crystals (125), The Bigger You are the More You Crush (239), Temperatures on Batteries (244), Follow the Bouncing Ball (243), M&M Mania (224), In What Liquid do Sugar Crystals Grow Best (253), and Dog Scents-Sense (179).

Considered the Sistine Chapel of the modern era and overseen by the Benedictine monks at Saint John's Abbey in Minnesota, *Illuminating the Word: The Saint John's Bible* features forty-four pages of the first modern-day Bible entirely handwritten and illuminated in 500 years. A double page is two feet high and three feet wide with calligraphic script fashioned by a feathered quill and illuminations shimmering with gold.

The C & C program was successfully transferred from Los Alamos Branch to Santa Fe Branch where it continued under the leadership and direction of Mary. C & C has been received with enthusiasm and interest in Santa Fe. AAUW Santa Fe has plans to continue as elementary schools call to ask to be scheduled and evaluations continue to be positive.
