The book relates the experiences of the author's poor London family living through both the depression of the 1930's and the subsequent years of WWII during which Gwen was sent to a long line of different homes outside London for safety.

In the author's words: "It was a casual kitchen conversation with my son, then about nine or ten, that sowed the seed from which this chronicle grew. An incident from my childhood had figured in that conversation, and afterwards, he stared at me as if I were a stranger and said, "I never knew any of that stuff about you!" And I realized, for the first time, that my children knew me only as I was then: a mother of four, living a comfortable, privileged existence. The seed lay dormant for a very long time. And then, as my story unfolded, so did others: my mother's story, and the story of a place, a time, and a way of life, all of which have virtually vanished. As a result, although this chronicle can be read as a personal memoir that ends at the point where my life became something that my children would recognize as "normal", it is also a portrait of Britain and of those among her people that I knew during eighteen eventful years in the 1930' and 1940's."

Biography of the Month:



Virginia McClurg

Raised in New York City and educated in Virginia, McClurg became a well-known writer and traveled west in 1877, to improve her health. McClurg's acceptance of a writing assignment for the *New York Daily Graphic* resulted in her becoming one of the first white women to view the prehistoric cliff dwellings near Mesa Verde. This experience transformed McClurg and began her lifelong interest in preserving Colorado's Native American sites.

McClurg published sketches and lectured widely on the ruins and gained support from the 5,000 member Colorado State Federation of Women's Clubs which created the Colorado Cliff Dwellings Association (CCDA). This organization surveyed the ruins and paid for an accurate map and a road into the site. Unfortunately, infighting between McClurg, the CCDA's regent for over thirty years, and her vice-regent, Lucy Peabody, nearly sidetracked her hard fought preservation efforts. A disagreement over whether Mesa Verde would be better served as a national park or a state park, under control of the CCDA, divided supporters. On June 29, 1906, Peabody prevailed, and Mesa Verde was officially designated a national park. In the bill establishing the national park, the Hogg bill, the boundaries of the park excluded all major ruins. Fortunately two weeks later the bill was amended to state that all ruins within five miles of the park boundary would be administered as part of the park.

While McClurg lost the battle to keep control of the park in state hands, she succeeded in having the area preserved for future generations. Until her death in 1931, she continued to raise money to support restoration work in the park and to write about the beauty of Mesa Verde's landscape.
