Hurricane Response: The Public Policy & Government Relations department of AAUW in the days following hurricane Katrina began working in consultation with members of Congress to understand and address the education, health care, and financial needs of the Hurricane Katrina victims. These key issues are among AAUW long-standing public policy priorities—education, health care, economic security, and federal budget reconciliation.

**New Membership Rules**: AAUW now admits to membership a graduate holding an associate

degree or equivalent degree from a qualified educational institution. An associate's degree is a degree awarded by community colleges, junior colleges, and bachelor's degree-granting colleges in the USA and Canada. These degree programs would usually constitute two years of course study and require 60 credit hours as the two-year standard.

The equivalent of an associate degree is an academic degree or diploma awarded by a qualified institution such as a business college or a hospital, which may not be called

"associate degree" but has the same academic requirements or greater. Examples would be two-or three-year RN diplomas.

As a volunteer lobbyist, Corinne Howell Wolfe lobbied on behalf of issues involving teen pregnancy, prenatal care, unemployed workers, frail and elderly citizens, and other human service

projects. In 1972, Ms. Wolfe returned from Washington DC and established a master level program at Highlands University in Las Vegas and dedicated herself to create a coordinated community in-home care program for the frail, elderly, and disabled. She was honored by having the Corinne Wolfe Children's Law Center named for her. The center within the Institute of Public Law at the University of New Mexico School of Law is dedicated to improving outcomes for children involved in abuse or neglect and delinquency proceedings in New Mexico. Ms. Wolfe also was involved with the Children's Trust Fund and received the Distinguished Service Award; the Governor's Volunteer Award, and the Santa Fe Living Treasure Award.
