Special Invitation from the LWV: League Meeting Features Mid-East Expert Emile Nakhleh on September 16

Dr. Emile Nakhleh, author of an acclaimed new book about US-Muslim relations, will speak about "Key Issues in the Middle East" on Wednesday, September 16, at 7 p.m. in the Lecture Hall of Building 2 at UNMLA. Refreshments will be served at 6:30, and we especially welcome our AAUW sisters.

As former director of the CIA Political Islam Strategic Analysis Program and current member of the Council on Foreign Relations, Nakhleh advised the White House on the speech that President Obama gave in Cairo in June.

Dr. Nakhleh's book, titled A Necessary Engagement: Reinventing America's Relations with the Muslim World, focuses on the misperceptions of Americans about Islam and vice versa. Muslims' negative views of the West are not based on distrust of democratic ideals or social values, but rather on what they call '21st-century colonialism'--wars, occupations, and aggressive rhetoric directed at Muslim countries. One Muslim contact told him, "You can't conduct public diplomacy through the barrel of a gun, boots on the ground might bring you military victory but won't win hearts and minds." Similarly, Americans mistakenly view Muslims through the distorting "prism of terrorism" and fail to see that most Muslims condemn terrorism and support ideas of good governance. He proposes a 10-point plan of diplomatic approaches to rebuild Western/Muslim relations.

Dr. Nakhleh was born in Palestinian Galilee, raised a Greek Catholic, emigrated from Israel to the US as a young man, and taught for 26 years before joining the CIA. He is an Arabic speaker; his analyses are based on extensive interviews with Muslims from more than thirty countries. The talk is free and onen to the public. Please come and bring a friend.
