Branch News Fall Luncheon Update

Our Fall Luncheon was a very successful kickoff to a new year of Branch activities. The 39 members and guests who attended were inspired by the drive and goals of our two AAUW scholarship recipients, Santana Garcia-Chang and Andrea Tuero, and were treated to light-hearted personal recollections from Jean Nereson's family and close friends. The latter's stories offered telling insight into her career as an educator and the ways in which she touched so many lives in our community. "Remembering Jeanie" was itself a touching memorial to her life.

Due to an excellent turnout, luncheon proceeds (\$620) exceeded costs. The luncheon charge of \$20 was set to cover catering costs plus lunch for the eight Branch guests who spoke to us. Catering expenses were \$473.86. At their September 24 meeting, therefore, the Coordinating Council voted to give \$100 from the luncheon proceeds to the Jean Nereson Books Memorial and to use the remainder of the surplus to defray printing and postage expenses for advertising the Memorial.

Council Supports Mesa Public Library

Mesa Public Library asked us to support its application to host the American Library Association's traveling exhibit on the 1930's Dust Bowl: "Dust, Drought, and Dreams Gone By." Carol Meine noted in her request that the exhibit will emphasize women's voices and eloquence about their experiences living through this epic drought. The ALA will select 25 sites to host the exhibit based on a competitive process that includes partnering with local organizations to promote the exhibit and reach the widest possible public audience. As resources for local programming, Oklahoma State University Library's "Women in the Dust Bowl" online oral history archives and Mount Holyoke College Library's collection of the papers of Caroline Henderson, who farmed throughout the period, will be made available.

By way of support, the Coordinating Council offered to facilitate community discussions of *The Worst Hard Time*, an award-winning history of the Dust Bowl by Timothy Egan. We noted our Branch's experience in researching and critiquing books through our fiction and nonfiction interest groups, and expressed interest in accessing the two university archives to gain insights for discussing Egan's book. We also promised to promote the exhibit to nearby AAUW branches.

In a complementary letter of support from Los Alamos High School, Margo Batha proposed that students in AP English and History classes would participate with us in the community-wide readings of *The Worst Hard Time*, and that as Mount Holyoke College alumnae, she and her LAHS colleague Cecily Merrill would be thrilled to work with Caroline Henderson's letters.

Mesa Library is also partnering with the Bradbury Science Museum and PEEC in their application. If selected, Meine said she would most likely request the exhibit for Jan./Feb. 2015 or 2016. Selected sites will be announced in April 2014. So keep your fingers crossed that we will have the opportunity to work with the library and LAHS students in support of this timely traveling exhibit.

Non-fiction book club members will recall that our group read Timothy Egan's well-written and moving book that contained personal stories of families living through the era. Many of us viewed the PBS series on the dust bowl. Some of our members lived through the dust bowl. If the library is successful in winning the opportunity to host this exhibit, the community will benefit by exposure to an era of our country's history that should not be forgotten.

Los Alamos Branch of AAUW and the Nereson Family are offering an opportunity to honor Jean Nereson, an elementary school teacher for fifty years in Los Alamos County Public Schools and active AAUW member. Jean was respected and loved by her students, and she dedicated her 50+ year career to their education and well-being. To honor Jean a memorial fund has been established through the Los Alamos Public Schools Foundation, which will collect and administer the fund at no cost.
