### AAUW-NM Leaders Meeting

The highlight of the Feb. 8 Leadership Team Meeting was having AAUW's Executive Director, Linda Hallman, talk to us about what's going on at national. She is a dynamic spokesperson for AAUW values and programs and was very interested in our NM initiatives. She announced that AAUW's next research report, "Solving the Equation: Women in Engineering and Computing," will be released March 26 at a media event held at Samsung's headquarters in Menlo Park, CA. This report is the follow-on to "Why So Few?" National is working hard to build corporate sponsorships like its new one with Samsung to support its varied STEM projects. It is also working hard to expand its academic ties: AAUW now has about 900 university and college partners.

# AAUW Day at the Roundhouse

On Monday, Feb. 9, about 20 AAUW members gathered at the Roundhouse to lobby for legislation being followed by AAUW-NM. Linda Hallman and Sonya Berg, our state Public Policy chair, were recognized in the House when it passed a Memorial proclaiming Feb. 9, 2015 as "American Association of University Women New Mexico Day." At noon, AAUW-NM held a press conference in the Rotunda of the Roundhouse to support House Bill 37, the Pregnancy Accommodation Act. This bill would require all employers to give pregnant women up to 3 months unpaid leave before, during, or after pregnancy. As Linda argued, "pregnant employees should not be forced to choose between the wages they need and the health of their pregnancies." In addition to AAUW members, the press conference attracted members of the League of Women Voters, NOW, and others supporting women's issues.

### Los Alamos County Science Fair Judging The AAUW Tradition Continues

In the early 1980s, AAUW branch members Chris Sierk and Nina Thayer saw an opportunity for AAUW to give awards to elementary students, because at that time very few prizes were awarded to the younger youth who were submitting science fair projects. Rosemarie Frederickson has since overseen this branch activity for more than 25 years.

This year the AAUW members on the judging team were Marilyn Doolen (lead judge) Rosemarie Frederickson, Nina Thayer, Mona Wecksung, and Alahna Weller.

Sheri Lopez and Ben Katko, the UNM-LA student members of the team, were excellent additions because of their enthusiasm, their careful observations, and constructive critiques. They participated because Helena Whyte had contacted the advisor of Phi Theta Kappa (the honor society at UNM-LA) with an invitation to interested STEM students (science, technology, engineering, mathematics majors). Their involvement strengthened our AAUW Affiliation with UNM-LA.

The team judges each diligently looked at the elementary level exhibits and then collectively chose 20 individual projects, which received \$5.00 and a personal note, and 5 class projects which received \$15.00 and a personal note.

The following students received individual awards: 4<sup>th</sup> graders: Isabella Matiegue, Lily New, Eva Alexander, and Maria Fanelli; 5<sup>th</sup> graders: Kim Yunseo, Keira Henson, Charlie Young, Travis Anderson, William Szinger, Anna Balista, Wayne Williams, Sam Wolfsberg, Stephanie Peters, Anana Garcia, Jason Pieck, Westley Parker, Isaac Lynn and Nathan Gidden, Jeanine Fassbender, and Sara Franco.

During the judging hours, Tinka Gammel gave the team \$50.00 in cash to use for any class project that the team deemed worthy of recognition. She and the team agreed that the class awards are very valuable because they allow more students to participate, and thereby learn teamwork. It also gives credit to the teacher.

As I departed, a young junior level participant told me that she was so pleased to receive our award given her in a previous year. She and her mother had looked up AAUW to see what the organization represents and they were very impressed.
