

Life on the Rocks: One Woman's Adventures in Petroglyph Preservation

Our speaker is Katherine Wells, a mixed-media artist and founder of the Vecinos del Rio Mesa



Prieta Petroglyph Project. Ms. Wells and Lloyd Dennis, her partner, purchased almost two hundred acres of Mesa Prieta near Española in northern New Mexico. The large boulders on the property contained many examples of rock art from previous Native and Spanish inhabitants and the lure was overwhelming.

Up to 70,000 petroglyphs may exist on this remote and ancient land. Come and hear Ms. Wells tell us about her love of petroglyphs and how she became involved in their preservation. Ms. Wells is the Author of <u>Life on the Rocks: One Woman's</u> <u>Adventures in Petroglyph Preservation</u> (2009).

Human Trafficking Program

Thursday, April 30, 7-8 pm Mesa Library upstairs conference rooms

Human trafficking is a serious global challenge, affecting millions of women and men. However, it is estimated that women account for nearly 60% of all human trafficking victims,



with women and girls together representing 75% of known victims. What is the impact of human trafficking in our state--and what is being done to assist its victims? How can we raise awareness of this widespread human rights issue?

Maria Sanchez-Gagne and Lynn Sanchez will address these and related issues in their talk on human trafficking. Sanchez-Gagne is Director of the New Mexico Border Violence Division, which represents the State Attorney General in cases involving the investigation and prosecution of human trafficking. She helped draft New Mexico's human trafficking law. Sanchez founded and directs the state's human trafficking hotline, 505-GET-FREE, works with Life Link's Aftercare program for victims, and directs Sojourners Advocacy Cafe, an outreach center for homeless and disenfranchised women and their children. Join us this Thursday to learn more about how our state is tackling the challenge of human trafficking.

There are three other options for voting:

- 1. Go to the e-mail notice sent from AAUW Membership on April 16: "Here's your AAUW ballot. Vote now." Click on the red button "Just click here to vote," review the ballot, and vote.
- 2. Go to www.aauw.org and click on the VOTE button:
 - enter your member ID, click on Search
 - enter your voter PIN
 - review the ballot and vote
 - Online voting ends June 19.
- **3.** Request a paper ballot by either e-mailing connect@aauw.org or calling 1-800-326-2289. Paper ballots must be requested by May 8 and postmarked by May 26.

The ballot also includes voting on

- proposed changes to the Public Policy Program,
- proposed Bylaw amendments,
- AAUW President and Vice President (both running unopposed), and
- 10 Board members (from 15 candidates).

The Spring/Summer issue *AAUW Outlook* has a section on all ballot measures, including short bios/statements from all Board candidates. Even if you vote only for AAUW President and Vice President, your ballot will count toward the required election quorum (5% of members voting).

Pick an option and VOTE! Make your voice heard.
