At the Fall Luncheon, Malea Joyce and Sarah Crotzer, two Los Alamos Middle Schoolers who attended Tech Trek this summer, will share highlights of the camp with us. Julie Goen, Pinon School librarian, will give us an update on how funds from the Jean Nereson Books Memorial have benefited our elementary school libraries. And members who attended AAUW's convention in San Diego will talk about convention highlights. Lunch will be catered by Ruby K's, and we'll begin with a brief business meeting.

On Thursday evening, we will join the League of Women Voters in co-sponsoring a talk by Dr. Emile Nakhleh, a retired Senior Intelligence Service Officer and Research Professor at UNM. He has written extensively on the Arab Spring, Islamic radicalization, and Muslim world engagement.

AAUW 2015 Convention News from San Diego

A hearty thank you to my Los Alamos Branch for the \$100 that helped me with the considerable expenses involved with attending this year's AAUW biennial convention in San Diego. We had 17 members attending from New Mexico and five of us from this branch, if we include Rilla Baxter, an active member in Los Alamos from 1997-2005 and still very active in her San Diego Branch.

The new research rolled out, "Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing," looks even deeper than earlier research into the reasons for such a low participation rate for women in the specific STEM fields of engineering and computing. I believe this touches and did touch the careers of many of us in this branch. I promise you, we will have a public forum on this research.

The "One Member, One Vote" bylaws change of 2009 stripped the convention of the excitement of elections and hotly contested issues in return for increased time for motivating speakers, knowledgeable panels and powerful workshops. Clearly, at this convention, this was not a negative, although I dearly loved the business meetings with their insightful and unpredictable oral debates. I was very pleased to observe far more young members with wider diversity than my first national convention thirty years ago or even two years ago in New Orleans.

The issue of dropping the degree requirement for AAUW membership took none of the attendees' time or attention. There was no time assigned for debate or discussion. Results were announced that with 12% of the membership voting, 55.5% voted against, 40.9% voted for and 3.6% voting did not register an opinion. It is my observation that the need for a degree requirement is not so strong with our younger members. So it will be interesting to watch, as they age, if their opinions change or whether the degree requirement will be increasingly irrelevant.
