

## "Our Woman in Havana" Ambassador Vicki Huddleston

# Mesa Public Library Conference rooms Tuesday, March 7, 7-8 pm



Ambassador Vicki Huddleston's talk is based on her years as one of America's top Cuba hands. Huddleston has been an eyewitness to key moments of history as well as to backroom policy debate, in her roles as a principal policy maker on Cuba at the State Department and as the Chief of the U.S. Interests Section in Havana. She will provide a behind-the-curtain view of such controversial episodes as the Elián González custody saga

and the post-9/11 decision to use Guantanamo as a prison for terror suspects.



Vicki's anecdotes of her life in Havana—everything from spy stories to an argument with Fidel Castro she had at a cocktail party—are sometimes poignant, at other times hilarious, and always delightfully candid. She will wind up her talk with some thoughts on whether President Trump will continue the historic diplomatic shift engineered by Presidents Obama and Raul Castro.

Huddleston managed American policy toward Cuba as the Coordinator of Cuban Affairs at the State Department in Washington, DC, under

Presidents George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton from 1989 to 1993. Six years later she led our diplomatic mission to Havana from 1999 to 2002, under Clinton and George W. Bush.

Her diplomatic career has spanned two continents and two government agencies. She was Ambassador to Mali and to Madagascar and acting Ambassador to Ethiopia. During the Obama administration, she served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, where she was responsible for policy guidance to the Secretary of Defense and the African Command.

Now living in Santa Fe, Huddleston provides media commentary on both Cuba and Africa, with her appearing in *The New York Times, Miami Herald,* and *Washington Post*.

## 2017 AAUW-NM State Convention April 21-23, 2017

We are hosting the 2017 AAUW-New Mexico State Convention in April. We have planned a variety of activities that draw on the science our community is known for, showcase local attractions like our new PEEC planetarium, and feature the work AAUW is doing to promote gender equality.

#### Friday, April 21

•We will meet in the lower-level meeting rooms of the Oppenheimer Place Condos. Registration starts at 2 pm, and the Leadership Team Meeting will run from 2:30 to 4:30. After dinner at local restaurants, we'll gather at the Los Alamos Nature Center for a planetarium show. And before leaving, we'll enjoy tempting desserts from The Pig & Fig Café.

### Saturday, April 22

- Registration starts at 8 am, with the convention opening at 9 am in the main meeting room of the Holiday Inn Express. Anne Hedgepeth, Senior Government Relations Manager for AAUW, will talk about AAUW's involvement in international collaborations to promote gender equality and educational opportunities for women, provide insights into AAUW's latest research report, *Higher Ed, Higher Debt*, and share news from national.
- After lunch catered by Ruby K's, Fattaneh Behdani, an AAUW International Fellowship recipient, will talk about her engineering studies at NMSU and plans to promote STEM studies to women when she returns home to Iran.
- At 1:30 pm, we'll tour the New Mexico Consortium's Biological Laboratory and learn about its unique research. Formed by UNM, New Mexico Tech, and NMSU, the consortium collaborates with LANL and industry in research that ranges from improving algae as a feedstock for biofuels to extending the shelf life of cassava roots, benefiting women farmers in sub-Saharan Africa. (Note: you'll need closed-toe shoes and long pants for the tour.)
- Back at the hotel, the AAUW-NM business meeting will run from 3 to 4:30 pm. That evening, we'll dine at Cottonwood on the Greens for our banquet.

#### Sunday, April 23

• We will return to the Oppenheimer Place Condos for Sunday's meetings, which start at 8:30 am and will include discussions of public policy and officer training, a diversity workshop led by Julia Brown, and a Town Hall Meeting. The convention will adjourn at noon.

On Saturday and Sunday, we are offering to lead early morning (7 am) exercise walks on the Canyon Rim Trail, conveniently located near the Holiday Inn Express.
