It takes women about 15 months to earn what men earn in 12, thanks to the gender pay gap. This has lifelong consequences and affects every aspect in a woman's career and retirement. We take note of this gap every April on a day known as Equal Pay Day, which is the symbolic day when women's earnings (77 cents to men's dollar) finally catch up to men's earnings from the previous year. Equal Pay Day is a powerful occasion to raise awareness of the gender pay gap in our communities.



What can we do:

Wear Red on Equal Pay Day, April 10 2018 to symbolize how far women "are in the red" with their pay.

Encourage our daughters and friends in the workplace to negotiate for fair pay.

U.S. Children Now Draw Female Scientists More Than Ever Researchers at Northwestern

University have analyzed five decades of "Drawa-Scientist" studies conducted since the 1960s, and found U.S. children now depict scientists as female more than ever. They say this trend suggests children's stereotypes connecting science only with men have weakened over time, which is consistent with more women becoming scientists and children's media depicting more female scientists on TV shows, magazines, and elsewhere. The Northwestern study is the first systematic, quantitative review of the "Draw-a-Scientist" literature and combined results from 78 U.S. studies, including more than 20,000 children in kindergarten through 12th grades. The researchers also analyzed how children form stereotypes about scientists across childhood development, with the results suggesting children do not associate science with men until about age five. The researchers also found during elementary and middle school, the tendency to draw scientists as male rose strongly with age. U.N. Commission on the Status of Women

For our March branch program, Nancy Scheer and Lynn Heffron gave the branch a most informative talk on the U.N. Commission on the Status of Women. Both attended this meeting in past years. There were many parallel sessions, some open only to official delegates and others offered by NGOs open to the public. Choosing which sessions to attend was a daunting task as the locations required long walks through New York City streets. Much of the value of attending the conference came from networking with other women with similar goals. In 2018, 45 countries were members of this commission, including 13 from Africa, 11 from the Asia-Pacific region, 4 from Eastern European states, 9 from Latin American & Caribbean states, and 8 from Western Europe and Other States. The United States was not a member in 2018, as membership rotates. 2018 was the sixty-second session of the commission. The Commission has 17 sustainable development goals for 2015-2030, including no poverty, no hunger, good health, quality education, gender equality, clean water and sanitation, clean energy, good jobs and economic growth, reduced inequalities, sustainable cities and communities, responsible consumption, protect the planet, life below water, life on land, peace and justice, and partnerships for the goals.
