Budget Needs: After considerable discussion the following motion was unanimously voted upon and passed by Coordinating Council: to increase the branch dues to \$20.00 (from \$10.00.)

The membership vote will be taken at the branch annual meeting (Spring Tea) in May. There will be time for discussion at the tea. The date for the tea will be announced in the March Hilltopics; be sure to attend. If the increase is approved, the new rate will be in effect in 2020.

The driving justification for the dues increase is that for many years we have been meeting branch expenses by using money from past savings. This cannot continue. While our dues have remained constant our fixed expenses have increased. Additionally, our mission is to support gender equity for women and girls. In order to accomplish this mission we would like to increase awards for the Los Alamos Science Fair participants, to support young women candidates in AAUW programs such as NCCWSL, and possibly establish a scholarship at UNM-LA for a non-traditional female student.

LOS ALAMOS COUNTY SCIENCE FAIR REPORT January 19, 2019

The AAUW branch judges were: Beverly Cooper, Marilyn Doolen (lead), Karen Henderson, Mary Ann Lindahl, Terry Marzili, Judy Prono, Nina Thayer, Alahna Weller. There were 53 total projects entered (including 4 class projects) in the Elementary Level in the categories of Life Sciences, Earth Sciences, and Physical Sciences.

The team awarded the following class projects with a personal note and \$15.00: **Barranca Kindergarten**, Heidi Schembri, Teacher (Physical Science) *Rocking Robots* **Aspen 2nd grade**, Rachel Bartram, Teacher (Earth Science) *Erosion* **Aspen 5th grade**, Stacey Martens, Teacher (Physical Science) *Dissolve it All*

The following single entries were awarded with a personal note and either \$5.00 or \$10.00, in the categories of Life Science, Earth Science or Physical Science:

Micah Finstad, Biodegradable Plastics Maclain Griffin, A Meteorite hit my house (and I lived to tell about it) Aditya Viswanathan, Wildfire Patterns on the Pajarito Plateau Nishta Mukundan, To Kill or Not to Kill Ayva Preston, Using Thieves Oil to Kill Bacteria Matthea Fung, Dissection and Structure of a Bold-Faced Hornet's Nest Noah Bane, Robotic Catapult Projectiles and Energy Use Penelope Barry-Hoffman, The Effect of Car Pollution on pH Michelle Jackson, Simple Electric Motors Aislim Marshall, Playing with Sound Materials and Sound Absorption Anna Simakov, Feynman's Spaghetti

The team identified good hypotheses, age-appropriate experimentation, good explanations, and good data, as well as creativity.

The following were submitted as Best of Show; Aditya Viswanathan (Life Science); Aspen 2nd grade (Earth Science); Barranca Kindergarten (Physical Science).

It is noted that 2 student awardees were repeat awardees from 2018.

There was a pre-Fair judging at the elementary schools that resulted in fewer entries to review. This gave the team members adequate time to review and choose the most outstanding projects.

The team strongly recommends that the AAUW branch budget for 2019/2020 include funding to allow a minimum of \$10.00 for individual projects and a minimum of \$20.00 for class projects. (\$200 to \$300 is recommended to accomplish this goal.)

The volunteers on the judging team continue to feel this is an important contribution to the community following the tradition established by Chris Sierk and Nina Thayer in the early 1980s to recognize and award the younger youth. We are encouraging this age group to stay curious and extend their interest in science that can be fun. After the Fair, hand written thank you notes came from Mrs. Schembri's Kindergarten class students. They will use the award money for a field trip to the PEEC and will buy more science supplies.
