Roundhouse Roundup

The governor has signed SB 10, repeal of the old (1969) abortion ban, reestablishing women's rights

to make their own healthcare decisions. In other legislation AAUW is following, the Redistricting Act (HB 211/SB 199) has hit a roadblock in terms of House Speaker Brian Egolf's opposition. There is talk that SB15, sponsored by Sen. Ivey-Soto, will be pushed as a compromise bill that might gain support. However, that bill would create a redistricting commission drawn only from the state's political parties. The original redistricting bills would have the parties name members to the commission but also have the State Ethics Commission appoint members and have the commission chaired by a member of the state judiciary. Lynn Heffron, AAUW-NM co-President, wrote a letter to the editor in the Feb. 27 Santa Fe New Mexican noting AAUW's support for the original bills ("AAUW supports independent commission for redistricting"). It's all about transparency and public input in redrawing state election districts after the 2020 census.

AAUW-NM's Lobby Corps is also following HB38, Paid Family & Medical Leave Act, and HB 110, Phased Minimum Wage. These have been proceeding through committee hearings but their futures are uncertain given the governor's recent comments that this is not the time for their passage. We are also following SB 66/HB 99, the predatory lending acts that would cap interest rates on small loans (<\$10K) at 36%; they are awaiting committee hearings in both houses.

As we come down the home stretch of this Legislative session, which ends March 20, you may receive email requests to get in touch with Rep. Chandler or Sens. Jaramillo/Gonzales to support these or other bills we are following. There is sure to be a frenzy of legislative activity as we move through March.

'Life is just a box of chocolates'

This is a love story that extends over 52½ years. It is a vibrant red velvet heart loaded with rich caramels, truffles and crème selections and tied with a satin bow with shining loops. The story starts when the two, Maryjane and Gregg Giesler, met at the University of Illinois at Urbana; she a freshman and he a sophomore. They were introduced on a blind date arranged by her hall mate and his roommate.

He was a chemistry major, and she needed this subject and had to work hard on it in high school. She was an English major who had tested out of English 101 and 102, and he was in remedial English. So they both had ulterior motives for going on a second date. They dated until she went on to student teach in a suburb of Chicago. But the sweetest caramel of all was when they were engaged and married on June 22, 1968.

Little did they know the adventure of that satin ribbon. After marriage, Gregg received his doctorate in nuclear

chemistry, and Maryjane got her M.A. in British lit, both from Michigan State University; Maryjane taught at Lansing Catholic Central. When Gregg was finished, they moved on to Los Alamos, so Gregg could work for the Lab. There they enjoyed their oldest daughter Susan. But the ribbon of adventure was not done with them. Nineteen months later. they had triplets, Jana, Jon and Jeff, the first set of triplets to be born in L.A., and then the excitement really started. Raising four children including triplets while building a home sure has a number of challenges, the chewy nougats in the heart-shaped box. This shows the degree of cooperation and communication needed to keep this family going. There were some real challenges including an egg story that would make anyone laugh, showing the need for good humor. Those years when all were in high school at LAHS and all played three sports apiece and showed the need for hard work and attention. But all four ended up in major universities, some on scholarships.
