Legislative Preview Thursday, January 6th, 6:30-8:30 pm with Rep. Christine Chandler, Sen. Roberto "Bobby" Gonzales, Sen. Leo Jaramillo.

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion

AAUW National has suggested that branches consider issues related to diversity, equity and inclusion. This came to mind as I was reading an article by Rev. Dr. Kristen L. Harper titled "A Theology of Darkness" in which she notes, "As a student of religion and race for many decades, I have been concerned about the consistent equating of darkness and blackness with negative qualities such as sin and despair...Phrases like 'dark mood' and 'dark night of the soul' only reinforce our negative feelings. We are taught to fear the dark—that all the monsters and demons come out in the dark. But those who hurt others under the guise of 'battling monsters' do so as much in the daylight as in the night". She suggests becoming aware of these connotations and to "Seek words to replace dark and black to describe a mood or experience...As you go about your week, seek positive black, brown and dark imagery."

I've been thinking about adjectives to use in place of '*black*' when I'm not describing a color, and quickly I found '*dire'*, '*woeful*', '*nasty*'. Add your own to the list.
