Public Policy Report

Branch members, Karin Roberts professionally coordinated refreshments from the branch, and Margo Batha moderated the proceedings at the Legislative Preview co-sponsored with LWV. If you missed the Preview, there is a link to a recording of the proceedings at: <https://youtu.be/1cTMj-ACPw0>.

Christine Chandler, our state representative, focused on AI and consumer protection and on Medical Malpractice and a Loan repayment package for health workers. Dist. 5 Sen. Leo Jaramillo (LA) spoke about interstate medical licensing compacts and support for rural communities. Dist. 6 Sen. Roberto Gonzales (WR) was unable to attend due to weather, but asked Sen. Jaramillo to speak about his issues: expanding fire crews to 6 full time crews, funding teacher medical insurance, and funding for rural transportation.

NM Legislature 2026: The 30-day session began Jan. 20 and is expected to focus on the budget with dollars for childcare for all being highly contentious. AAUW is watching several initiatives supporting medical care in our state, also initiatives to regulate the use of Artificial Intelligence and distribution of deepfake images.

AAUW-NM supports:

- NM joining all ten of the interstate medical personnel compacts. NM has been a part of the nurses compact for many years. While there is strong support for legislation allowing NM physicians to join these compacts, there is less enthusiasm for including other medical professionals, such as physicians' assistants, therapists, dentists, EMTs, psychologists, etc.
- HB 99 Medical malpractice (sponsored by Rep. Chandler) to include capping punitive damages and clarifying definitions. Between 2019-2024, NM was the only state to lose practicing physicians and the cost of malpractice insurance was the most cited cause. (Survey published in the Albuquerque Journal, Jan. 20, 2026)
- Distribution of Deepfake Images, HB22 and AI Transparency Act, HB28, both sponsored by Rep. Chandler.

DEI VICTIM: BREE FRAM

Colonel, SPACE FORCE, 2021–2025

As a kid, Bree Fram dreamed of becoming an astronaut. After 9/11, she joined the Air Force and deployed to the Persian Gulf, where she tested new technologies to protect convoys from improvised explosive devices. That assignment led to her specialty: managing teams that built novel systems. (One came up with tools that could be used to take over an attacking drone, forcing it to fall from the sky.) The military kept sending Fram back to school, and her advanced degrees piled up. When the Space Force was created, she drafted its blueprint for acquiring the technologies of the future and ensured that new initiatives didn't get smothered by bureaucracy. Her mission was cut short by a biographical fact: Fram is transgender. Upon arriving in office, Trump barred from service anyone who did not identify with their birth gender.

Fruit Project Report

We received a lovely thank you note from LA Cares for the fruit bags distributed during the December holiday food distribution; the letter is included at the end of this newsletter. The cash donation listed as \$811.54 includes \$400 donated last year but not entered into their books until January of 2025. In 2025, our branch collected \$1400; we spent \$988.06 on fruit (10% discount). All other supplies (bags, ribbons, candy) were contributed, leaving \$411.54. The \$811.54 donation is the sum of the \$400 from 2024 and the \$411.54 from this year to be used where most needed. Be sure to read the thank you letter, it summarizes the valuable work accomplished by this volunteer organization.

AAUW-Los Alamos LTM Report January 2026

In December, our members donated \$1400 to add fruit to LA Cares' monthly food distribution to families facing food insecurity in our community. Almost \$1000 was used to fill 117 bags with bananas, pears, mandarin oranges, and apples; the remaining funds were given to LA Cares to purchase fruit in January. Members decorated colorful holiday bags, stuffed them with fruit, and delivered them to the distribution site (see photo). This is an annual event that has become our branch project for the holidays.



We started January with our annual Legislative Preview at Fuller Lodge. We co-sponsor this event with LWV-Los Alamos, bringing our state legislators together to share their goals and expectations for the upcoming session and to answer questions from community members. Rep. Christine Chandler and Sen. Leo Jaramillo spoke to us, along with Kristina Fisher, Associate Director of Think New Mexico. Despite snowy conditions, we had a good turnout.

Presentations and discussions focused on healthcare issues, especially medical compacts and malpractice insurance reforms. Rep. Chandler spent much of her summer studying the malpractice issue and looking at what nearby states, like Colorado, have done to limit punitive damages. She is working on a bill that would cap these damages. Both malpractice reform and medical compacts are also among the top legislative goals that Think New Mexico will be pursuing this session, along with eliminating GRT on healthcare expenses.

In preparation for the upcoming Legislative session, Nina Thayer, our Public Policy Chair, discussed AAUW-NM's bill tracker (nmlegiswatch.org) at a recent Coordinating Council meeting. We will explain the online bill tracker and provide a link to it in our upcoming branch newsletter. This will give members direct access to the status of legislation AAUW-NM is following and help promote interaction with legislators on bills that need our support.

On January 24, we will again help judge in the Los Alamos Public Schools annual Science Fair, evaluating elementary-grade level projects. We write notes to encourage kids to remain scientifically curious and include small cash awards to recognize success in conducting and documenting their science projects. Judy Prono, AAUW-Los Alamos

You are amazing! Especially this fall, when the need has been far greater, you and the generous people of Los Alamos stepped up...big time!! We have many new donors, as well as returning contributors. Many are recurring monthly givers, which we greatly appreciate. We have been able to increase our food offerings each month, and to help more families with their rent or utility payments.


Your generous donation of \$811.54 (plus the beautiful fruit bags in December!) in 2025 is important to our mission of "preventing homelessness in Los Alamos County." With the food, rent and/or utility assistance we hope to help families remain in their houses with the pantry stocked and the heat on. Without your support, many struggling households in Los Alamos would be even more unstable.

Highlights of 2025:

- *Monthly food distributions served approximately 100 families each month (1,143) (2,649 individuals). We supplement food offerings from the Food Depot in Santa Fe with fresh fruits and vegetables, meat, cheese, eggs, butter, bread, cereal, juice, diapers, kid snacks, personal care items, dog and cat food, and special dietary needs. These items amount to approximately \$4,000 per month.
- *77 households received rent assistance (a total of \$37,222.00)
- *74 households received utility assistance (a total of \$30,924.00)
- *12 large food drives (businesses, churches and synagogue, civic organizations, and schools) and many smaller ones held by individuals or families
- *Our active Board of Directors and cadre of volunteers donated over 5,000 hours to make all this happen. (At \$20/hour, that's \$100,000 worth of efforts put into making sure our neighbors can remain in their homes.) We have no paid staff; we are 100% volunteers. Our operating costs are only 4% of our budget—essentials like insurance and phone.

We can only accomplish this amazing work of generosity because of you and other concerned community members like you. We are pleased to be the conduit through which your donations result in real life changes.
